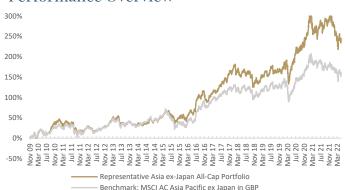

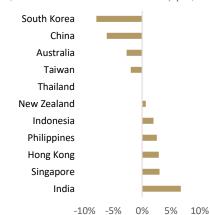

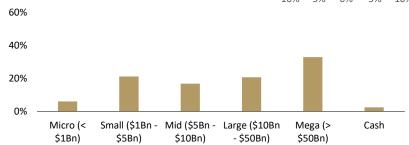
Relative Exposure

(Benchmark: MSCI AC Asia Pacific ex-Japan)



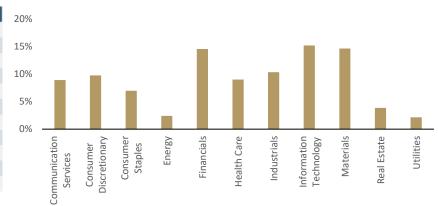

April 2022 Commentary

Overview

The Fund closed the month -1.89% versus the benchmark at -0.69%. Defensives, staples, and telcos performed better on a relative basis, while tech and internet lagged. China continued to enforce a strict lockdown policy with Shanghai experiencing the severest measures. This is having a significant impact on the domestic economy, as well as causing further disruption to logistics and supply chains globally. China announced a 25bps RRR cut which disappointed investors who were expecting something more substantial.

Performance

This month's top performers were, Calix, Aier Eye Hospital and Cisarua Mountain Dairy (Cimory). Australian listed carbon capture enabler Calix announced that its second demonstration facility had passed its Financial Investment Decision (FID) and would begin construction in 2023. Calix also signed an agreement with Suvo Strategic Minerals, which will help accelerate the Metakaolin (cement additive) green cement supply initiative. Aier, China's leading ophthalmological service provider announced positive FY21 and Q122² results that were ahead of market estimates. In the short term there is some impact from lock-downs, but the outlook remains positive as they have a strong brand and are expanding both domestically and globally. We believe that the share price decline since the peak in July 2021 is overdone and have added to our position. One of Indonesia's leading dairy product suppliers Cimory announced a strong set of 1Q results, with sales +106% YoY³. Growth was supported by increased sales in UHT milk and new product innovation across protein-based food categories.

Detractors were, Megaport, China Merchants Bank, and Shenzhen Dynanonic. Megaport suffered a sell-off in April following its quarterly update, with management guiding for growth that was lower than the market had been forecasting. FX headwinds, alongside the operational shift in distribution to the partner channel 'go-to-market' took longer than expected to implement and impacted direct sales. China Merchants Bank announced the sudden departure of its President who is now under investigation. This had a negative impact on sentiment but is not expected to affect operations and the fundamental outlook. Their first quarter results were in line with expectations; NIM improved and growth in retail AUM remained robust. Dynanonic is a major supplier to the LFP battery producers such as CATL and BYD. The share price weakness is attributable to two insiders who sold their stakes upon the lock up expiry. Chairman Kong, who leads R&D and is involved in day-to-day operations has retained his stake in the business. Fundamentally we remain positive on the outlook.

Outlook

Inflationary pressure exacerbated by the war in Ukraine is impacting margins across the region. Markets have been derating since the start of 2021, driven primarily by China. The MSCI Asia Pacific ex-Japan is trading on a forward PE of 12x which is below the average since 2004⁴. However, compared to the rest of the world the region is offering value trading at -1sd and is at post-GFC trough levels.
