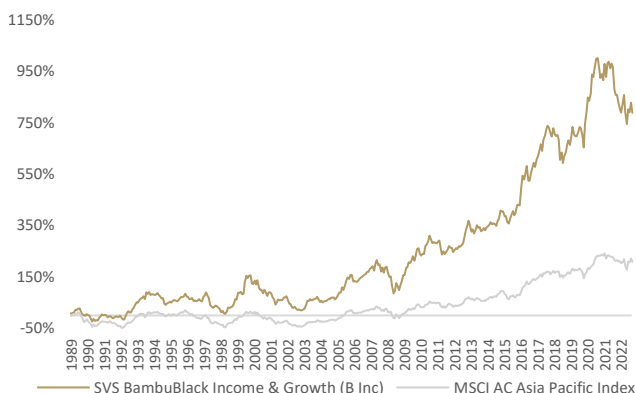


SVS BambuBlack Asia Income & Growth Fund

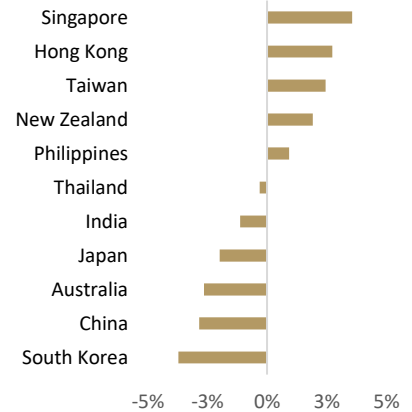

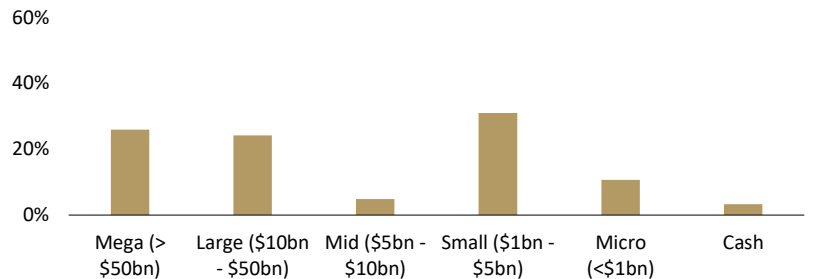
Relative Exposure

(Benchmark: MSCI AC Asia Pacific)



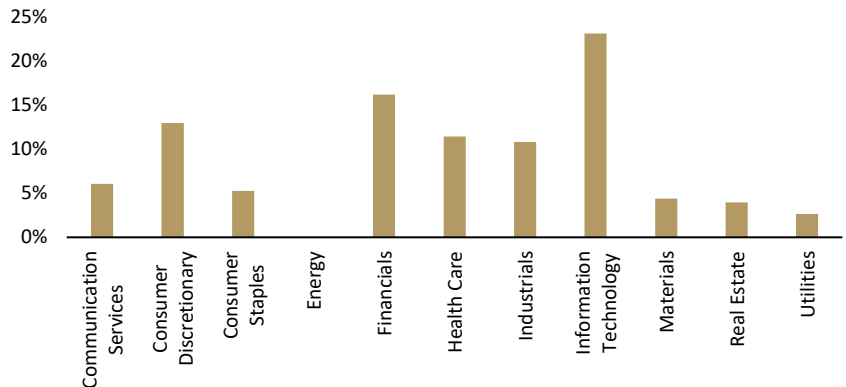

February 2023 Commentary

Market Overview

China saw a significant recovery, with subway, road traffic, logistics and dining out largely back to pre-Covid-19 levels. However, February was a weak month for equities, with the MSCI China losing -10.3% in US\$ terms over the month¹. A re-escalation in US-China tensions, lowered expectations for the twin sessions of the (NPC) National People's Congress and a more hawkish Fed weighed on markets across the region.

Performance

The fund closed February -4.24% versus the benchmark which was down -4.26%. Looking at sector allocation, Consumer Discretionary and Materials were the largest contributors, Chinese Industrials, and Healthcare the biggest detractors. At the stock level top contributors included, India's industrial gas provider Linde, PepsiCo bottler Varun Beverages and Singapore listed healthcare REIT Parkway Life. Detractors included Chinese EV producer BYD, which was impacted by aggressive price competition, Chinese industrial Morimatsu and power tool manufacturer Techtronic, which was subject to the release of a short seller's report. The consensus view is that the foundations of the report appear to be unsubstantiated, and the company released a quick rebuttal; the share price has subsequently shown signs of recovery.

Outlook

Markets are likely to remain choppy with macro events impacting sentiment. However, at a stock level there are companies that should be less sensitive to the vagaries of geopolitics and Central Bank policy. Healthcare, automation and digitalisation are areas we continue to favour. After the recent correction valuations are more supportive, with the benchmark MSCI AC Asia Pacific index trading on a 1 year forward PE of 11.4x¹.
